

The Holy Passion-Bearers Boris and Hlib

On Friday, July 24th, we honor in our Holy Church the first glorified/canonized saints-martyrs of our Ukrainian Church, the holy Passion-bearers Boris and Hlib. Who are these two brothers? How did they die?

Boris (in baptism David) and Hlib (in baptism Roman) were brothers by the same mother. Their father the great prince Volodymyr-Vladimir, before his baptism, had numerous wives and many children by them. Hence, Vladimir divided up the state among all of his sons before his death, and after his death the eldest son, Sviatopolk, became Prince of Kyiv (the main city of the state, Kyivan Rus'-Ukraine). But still Sviatopolk was jealous and wanted yet more power, and he planned to kill his brothers in order to gain their territories. Some of Vladimir's advisers

told Boris that he should take the army and establish himself as ruler of Kyiv. The holy martyr Boris, however, said that he could never lift his hand against his own brother. Sviatopolk sent assassins to kill Boris, who already knew that his brother wanted him dead. When they arrived they heard him chanting psalms and praying before an Icon of Christ. He asked the Lord to strengthen him for the suffering he was about to endure. He also prayed for Sviatopolk, asking God not to count this against him as sin. Then he lay down upon his couch, and the assassins stabbed him with their lances.

After Sviatopolk had killed Boris, he sent Hlib a message saying that their father was ill and wished to see him. As he was on his way, he received word that their father had died and that Sviatopolk had murdered Boris. The holy martyr Hlib wept for his father and brother, and was lamenting them when the assassins arrived. They seized his boat and drew their weapons, but it was Hlib's cook who stabbed him with a knife. The martyr's body was thrown onto the shore between two trees. Later, he was buried beside his brother St. Boris in the Church of St. Basil the Great. Although Boris and Hlib were not martyred for their faith (they are properly called 'passion-bearers' rather than martyrs), their voluntary and meek sacrifice for the sake of averting the suffering of others and preserving the Christian ideal, had a profound effect on the subsequent development of Christianity in Ukraine and the entire Eastern Church.

Commemoration of the Holy Fathers of the Six Ecumenical Councils

During the month of July (from 13-19), our Holy Church honors all the Holy Fathers that participated in the first six Ecumenical Councils. Why this special commemoration? These Holy Fathers of the Ecumenical Councils are honored by the Church because, based upon the preaching of the Apostles, they have established one faith for the Church. We must remember that these Holy Fathers (bishops, priests, monks) were guided by the grace of the Holy Spirit. Also we must be reminded that the Ecumenical Councils are the highest canonical and dogmatic authority in the Church.

In decisive moments of Church history, the Holy Ecumenical Councils promulgated their dogmatic definitions, as trustworthy delimitations in the spiritual



battle for the purity of true faith, which will last until such time, as "all shall come into the unity of faith, and of the knowledge of the Son of God" (Eph. 4: 13). In the struggle with new heresies, the Church does not abandon its former dogmatic concepts nor replace them with some sort of new formulations. The dogmatic formulae of the Holy Ecumenical Councils need never be superseded, they remain always contemporary to the living Tradition of the Church.

Therefore the Church proclaims: "The faith of all in the Church of God hath been glorified by men, which were luminaries in the world, cleaving to the Word of Life, so that it be observed firmly, and that it dwell unshakably until the end of the ages, conjointly with their God-bestown writings and dogmas. We reject and we anathematize all whom they have rejected and anathematized, as being enemies of Truth. And if anyone does not cleave to nor admit the aforementioned pious dogmas, and does not teach or preach accordingly, let him be anathema (denounced-accursed)" (Canon I of the Council of Trullo).

New historical conditions can lead to the change of some particular external aspect of the life of the Church. This makes creative canonical activity necessary in the conciliar reasoning of the Church, in order to reconcile the external norms of Church life with historical circumstances. On this Sunday we honor the Holy Fathers of these Ecumencial Councils who through their struggle and effort the Church was strengthened into one faith.
