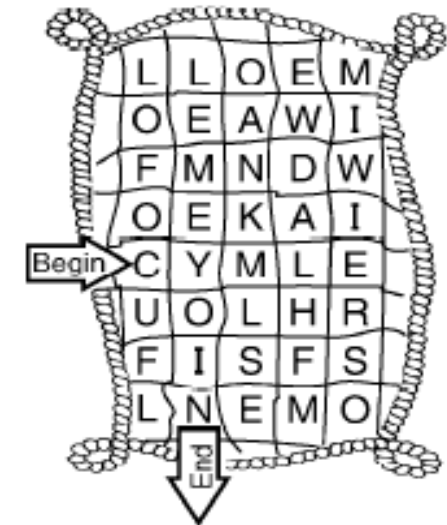

Second Sunday after Pentecost



Jesus said to them: "Follow Me, and I will make you fishers of men." They immediately left their nets and followed Him.

Mt. 4:19-20

On this Second Sunday of Pentecost we listen carefully to the Gospel reading from the holy apostle and evangelist Matthew (4:18-23) in which we witness the calling of the first apostles: Andrew, Simon-Peter, James and John.

There is a story about a little bird lying on its back in a field, its legs stretched up to the sky. Another bird saw this and landed next to it. "Little brother," he said, "What are you doing?" "Hush," the bird on its back said, "Don't disturb me. It might be fatal for all of us!" "What are you doing?" "Don't you understand," the bird answered, "I am carrying the sky. If I turn around, it will crash all over us." At that moment a gust of wind blew through a nearby tree. A branch fell off with a big crack and landed just behind the bird on its back. The frightened bird turned around and flew off. The sky remained in its place! In many cases we act as if we are carrying the whole world on our shoulders. We shouldn't. It will wear us out in no time.

Our Lord did not want to be left all by Himself when he started His ministry among us. One of the first things He did was to find some company. He needed comfort and support in his human nature. He had company around Him up to the last moment of His earthly life. In the garden of Gethsemane He pleaded with the disciples to remain with Him and not to fall asleep. From the cross, He was comforted by the compassion of the murderer on His side and by the presence of His mother Mary and the beloved disciple John.

He advised us not to remain alone on our way. He tells us to come to Him to ease our burden. If we all go to Him, we also come together to carry the weight of our task in this world side by side. Only in that way will we be able to work in the direction of the realization of God's vision for us, a peaceful and just world, the reign of God.

Remember the words of Our Savior: *"I shall be with you all days."* It is in Jesus' continuing presence that we find the courage to follow Him. Are we making the daily effort to realize that presence with us?
